2.1. Introduction

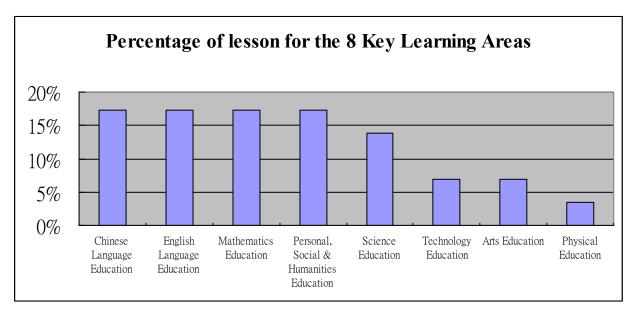
Po Leung Kuk Laws Foundation College was founded in 2004. It is a direct subsidy co-educational Anglo-Chinese secondary School managed by Po Leung Kuk. In this academic year, the number of active school days are 192 days.

2.2. Learning and teaching

Our school curriculum, structured to maintain both breadth and balance, is designed to cater for students' different needs, abilities and interests. The eight Key Learning Areas advocated by the Curriculum Development Council will form the backbone of school curriculum. A strong emphasis on "language has a central role in learning" and "a coherent, progressive and diversified career oriented and whole-person development curriculum for senior secondary students" serves to ensure a smooth transition from primary to secondary and to prepare students for lifelong learning and for career development.



The core of our Junior Secondary Curriculum consists of 15 subjects, i.e. Chinese Language, English, Mathematics, Integrated Science, Biotechnology, Geography, Economics, Business, Accounting and Financial Studies (BAFS), Chinese History, Computer and Information Technology, Technology & Living, Music, Visual Arts, Physical Education and Life Education.

In the course of designing the NSS curriculum, the school conducted surveys with S3 students in order to know the preference in subject selection. Based on the findings, the curriculum was worked out to meet the needs of students. The implementation of the block-timetabling system enables senior form students to select any electives from all streams. Without the boundary of streaming, students can maximize the combination of elective subject choices.

Language permeates the whole curriculum both as the vehicle for learning and as an object of study in its own right. English is the teaching medium for our formal curriculum except Chinese Language, Chinese History; while Putonghua is the teaching medium of the said two subjects.

As language is the tool to all learning, accessibility and enjoyment are of utmost importance. Language progression is vastly cultivated in our school through many ways:

- implementing morning and lunch reading sessions;
- integrating debate, drama and literature elements into the language curricula;
- organizing activities such as exchange programs with overseas schools;
- hosting inter-house drama, debate and public speaking contests;
- inviting international artists, athletes and professionals from around the globe to give talks and exchange with our students, which helps raise literacy standards by providing pupils with rich learning experiences.

As a 'through-train' secondary school, we strive to build on the excellent achievement of our affiliated primary school Po Leung Kuk Luk Hing Too Primary School. The two streams of our Arts Education, Music and Visual Arts, will play an important role for developing students' creativity and contributing to their whole-person development.

Our music education is not mandated for the small number of Music talents but to all our students. We encourage all our students to gain rich and comprehensive music experiences through participating in integrated activities of creating, performing and listening; to develop music skills, construct knowledge in music, and cultivate positive values and attitudes.

Our Visual Arts curriculum aims to broaden students' perspectives through exploring arts and cultures.

2.3. House system and Student Council

The school is divided into four Houses: Red, Yellow, Blue and Green to promote a positive attitude, fair play and sportsmanship.

- Students can represent their houses to compete in inter-house competitions and to develop a sense of team and belonging.
- It is also an alternative platform to expand students' social circles and foster friendships.
- Teachers are also allocated to different houses and they act as mentors to facilitate whole-person development.

Student Council, founded since 2007, has been formed to grant students authorities, obligations and rights to help build a good school environment. We believe that students, as one of the owners of this school, should be given autonomy and responsibility to voice out, participate and manage. We

believe that a better learning atmosphere, a sense of belonging and a spirit of democracy should be built and exercised with substantial enthusiasm and cooperation among teachers and students.

2.4. Facilities

2.4.1. Main facilities

We have a millennium school campus of about 7,000 m². With the school-wide optical fiber network, wireless network and 532 UTP network points, all classrooms, science laboratories and special rooms are connected to the Internet and equipped with computers, portable devices, projectors, visualizers, screen mirroring devices and cloud servers to facilitate teaching and learning into IT education.

To promote e-learning and STEM education, new facilities such as 3D printing and VR technologies are provided to arouse students' interest in learning and engage them with more "hands-on" investigations.

The DiagCor Biotechnology Laboratory, Integrated Science Laboratory, Physics Laboratory, Chemistry Laboratory, Stem Cell Science Laboratory, Law Cheuk Ecology Laboratory, Fashion and Textile Room and Innovative Cookery Room offer a better learning environment for experiments and practical lessons.

Workstations are set up in Lau Chan Siu Po Library to provide opportunities for independent studies as well as collaborative small group learning.

The two computer rooms equipped with Multimedia Learning Centre (MMLC) facilities are available for students to use during lunch time and after school. Large-scale lectures and video conferences can be held at the Lecture Theatre.

2.4.2. New Annex - A New Chapter Begins

The construction of the New Annex was commissioned in 2013 for the enhancement of the school's facilities. It was designed to provide a range of new facilities and the building program was distributed across five storeys. The swimming pool hall is a double-volume space located on G/F and 1/F; classrooms and staff facilities are on 2/F and 3/F; a Fitness Centre and a Multimedia Studio are 4/F; and a rooftop basketball court is on 5/F.

a. Swimming Pool Hall

The design of the Swimming Pool Hall evolved around the concept of translating the fluidity of water into aesthetic expressions. The movement of water was translated into curvatures which were then incorporated into the curved ceiling design. The pool can enhance the curriculum development of physical education and inquiry-based learning across subjects.

b. Fitness Centre

From the latest models of treadmills to the best resistance-training machines, students are exposed to a new world of physical education, so that a habit of healthy living and fitness training can be instilled in our students.

c. Multimedia Studio

The Multimedia Studio supports the curriculum development of Music and Information Technology and Communication. More opportunities will be provided for students to pursue excellence in Music. From string orchestra to brass band to orchestra, students are exposed to diversified music learning experience. In addition, the studio provides a platform for students to work together where STEM education can be facilitated.

d. Cantilevered Basketball Court

The basketball court was re-provided on the rooftop of the new annex and cantilevered beyond the floors for a more generous sports-ground. Because of its elevated height, the view is also broadened, creating a sense of openness.

2.6. Incorporated Management Committee

Our Incorporated Management Committee (IMC) has been formed since June 2008. There are altogether 14 registered School Managers, which consist of two Teacher Managers, one Alumni Manager and two Parent Managers, covenants to conduct the school in an efficient and proper manner and in accordance with the Education Ordinance, Hong Kong Special Administrative Region.

3.1. Class structure

A symmetrical class structure from S1 to S6 is adopted where there are five classes in each form, amounting to 30 classes in total.

Our students took part actively in various inter-school events. Appendix 1 shows the prizes awarded in this academic year.

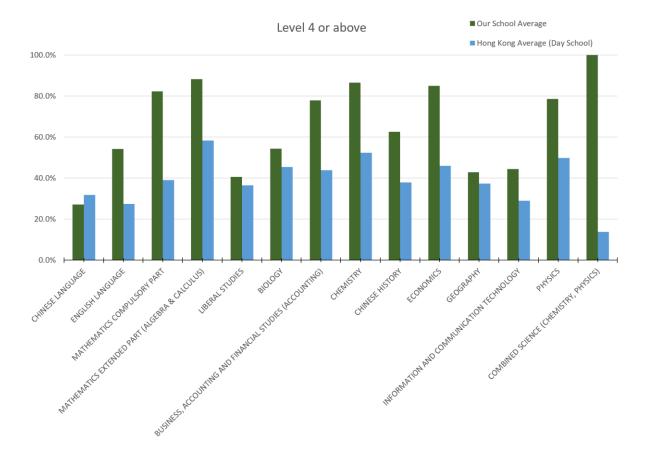
3.4. Results of public assessments

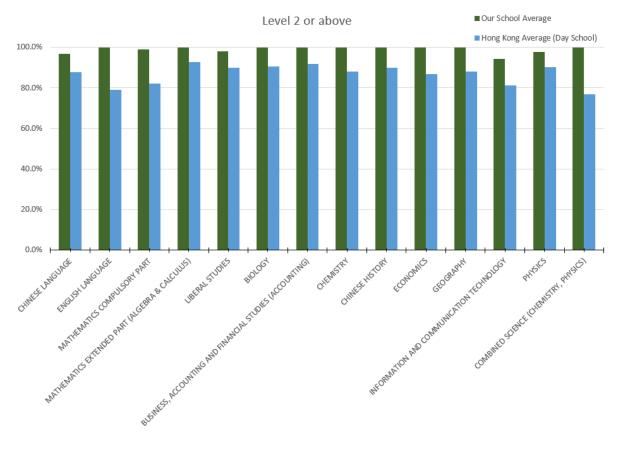
a. Pre-Secondary One Hong Kong Attainment Test 2022

3.5. Scholarships and fee remission

a. School scholarships and fee remission

The scholarship and the Fee Remission are granted through the deduction of the Tuition Fee, the total amount that any of our students can get should not exceed the total Tuition Fee for that year.

b. HKDSE Scholarship

Students who achieve a 5** are awarded a scholarship of HK\$2,000 for each HKDSE subject. Students who achieve a 5* are awarded a scholarship of HK\$1,000 for each HKDSE subject.

5. Achievements and reflection on major concerns and feedback on future planning Major concern 1: To further promote students' engagement in diverse learning experiences and maximize their learning outcome

Achievements

Our school has emphasized to enable students to attain all-round development and to be equipped with life-long learning capabilities in recent years. In School Development Plan 2019 - 2022, the framework of student engagement as well as teacher engagement was strengthened. Students' potentials and learning interests were further promoted through diverse types of learning activities and school-based curricula. To engage students in learning actively, they were guided and encouraged to set high expectations in everyday lessons and public examinations. During the period of 2020 - 2022, school's life was greatly affected by COVID-19 and many lessons can only be held in half-day mode or through online platforms during suspension of face-to-face classes. Both teachers and students developed strong skills of computer and information technology so that learning and teaching could continue during the pandemic. Together with good foundation of our school-based curricula and strong team of teachers, professional development of teachers continued to strengthen eLearning practices and curriculum development in the past three years.

In the academic year of 2021/22, our school focused on

- Promoting students' engagement in diverse learning experiences and maximize their learning outcomes;
- Increasing teachers' capacity for quality teaching; and
- Nurturing a positive culture and school norm through various learning experiences and extra-curricular activities.

Motivating students to maximize their potentials and acquire outstanding performance in various types of learning events

Our school has developed a comprehensive life and career planning scheme for S.1 - S.6 students. Students were guided to set both short-term and long-term goals so that they can formulate achievable and high expectations on their learning performance. The theme of life planning in 2021-2022 was "Tiny Habits" in which students were encouraged to make positive and realistic plans to achieve goals. To help students do self-assessment on their learning for more effective outputs after each school term, they were asked to evaluate how they learned and how teachers taught. This learning and teaching evaluation exercise provided constructive comments for students and teachers, promoting students' self-regulated learning attitude.

This year, our students obtained many outstanding awards in various inter-school and district events: Three students got Honourable Mention in Hong Kong Olympiad in Informatics; Two students were awarded Top Ten Outstanding Student Award of the 34th HKSAR Outstanding Students Selection and Outstanding Student Award in Outstanding Students Selection 2022 (Sai Kung District)

respectively; One student obtained Outstanding Performance in Commendation Scheme organized by Hong Kong Extra-curricular Activities Masters' Association; Three S.5 students were awarded Harvard Book Prize - Winner; Four students successfully joined CUHK Model United Nations Conference 2022 and got Honourable Mention; Two students received Silver Prizes in a speech competition organized by Hong Kong New Generation Cultural Association. Some other important prizes obtained by our students in 2021/22 include Ampower Talent Institute's IT, Tech & Innovation Master Class Program, The Student Health Captain Award Scheme, Writing Competition organized by The Hongkong Federation of Youth Groups, Best Idea Award in JA Innovation Camp, Tomorrow Leader Award by The Outstanding Young Persons' Association, Silver and Bronze Awards in Cisco Networking Academy Hong Kong and Macau Cisco Networking Skills Competition and many other prizes including the 1st, 2nd and 3rd places in the 73rd Hong Kong Schools Speech Festival. Two important awards in science were Third Prize in Junior Secondary School Energy and Environmental Science Section, Hong Kong Youth Science and Technology Innovation and First and Third Class Honours in International Junior Science Olympiad (IJSO) - Hong Kong Screening.

In addition to the above competitions, our students were stretched to achieve outstanding results in HKDSE 2022. Our S.6 students obtained significantly higher percentages of Level 5** and 5* when compared to Hong Kong's schools:

- Percentage of Level 5** obtained by our students: 2.9% (HK: 1.3%)
- Percentage of Level 5* or above obtained by our students: 12.3% (HK: 5.3%)

The total number of 5**/5* obtained by our 96 students were 75 in HKDSE 2022.

In HKDSE 2022, there were 19 students obtaining two or more 5*/5** or 30 marks or more in best 6 subjects.

The above strong figures indicate that our students achieved high credit-to-distinction rates in HKDSE.

In the academic years of 2019 - 2022, our school developed **four innovative curricula** supported by Quality Education Fund (QEF) to maximize students' potentials and interests in learning:

- (1) Development of School-based Archery Curriculum [Completed in 2020/21]
- (2) A Whole School PE curriculum of Fitness Training [Completed in 2020/21]
- (3) From Runway to Pathway: Establishing a School-based STEM Aerospace Learning Programme and Exemplary Laboratory [Completed in 2021/22]
- (4) STEM Education with a Focus on Stem Cell Science Development of School-Based Stem Cell Science Curriculum for Secondary School Students [Completed in 2021/22]

In the academic year of 2020/21, two of the projects (1) and (2) were successfully completed and integrated into daily PE lessons in 2021/22. Students can participate in a variety of PE programs including archery, fitness training, swimming and some non-traditional activities during PE lessons. In the academic year of 2021/22, STEM projects (3) and (4) were also successfully completed while they were greatly affected by COVID-19 pandemic. The project of aerospace aroused students' interest in flight training and aerospace science. Students were engaged in integrating knowledge of various subjects including Mathematics, Integrated Science, Physics and Chemistry in the curriculum of flight principles. Project (4) focused on the development of stem cell science curriculum which was integrated into our school-based biotechnology curriculum. This pioneer project motivated the establishment of a new laboratory called Stem Cell Science Laboratory on the 5/F in our Main Building, supporting students to carry out advanced experiments related to cell culture of rat or mouse brain stem cells. These four QEF-funded projects significantly increased school's capacities to create diverse learning opportunities for students.

To further maximize students' potentials and learning interests, Gifted Education Committee coordinated the development of school's gifted education programmes in which students' horizontal and longitudinal development can be catered. There is a variety of gifted education programmes organized by subject departments including English Language, Chinese Language, Mathematics, Science, Social Science, ICT, Sports and Visual Arts.

To safeguard National Security and promote National Security education, our school strengthened the curriculum development for National Security Education. In the academic year of 2021/22, our curriculum documents and teaching and learning materials of the following subjects were updated with the elements of National Security Law according to the guidelines set by the Education Bureau: Chinese Language, Technology education, BAFS, Information and Communication Technology, Integrated Science, Biology, Chemistry, Physics and Geography. Three inspections on learning and teaching materials were done on 6 October 2021, 15 November 2021 and 19 May 2022. To promote students' learning on Chinese culture related to National Security, our school held an activity in the morning assembly on 13 December 2021: 「銘記歷史・珍愛和平」南京大 屠殺 84 周年學校 悼念活動. In addition to displaying the national flag on each school day, our school held flag-raising ceremony every Monday so as to promote national education, help students develop a

sense of belonging to the country, an affection for the Chinese people and enhance their sense of national identity.

Reflection

Students' learning opportunities and effectiveness were affected by various modes of class suspension caused by COVID-19 pandemic. It is time to resume normal learning settings including whole-day face-to-face lessons so that students can be engaged in comprehensive and full dimensions of learning events. Learning goals as well as life and career plans should be strengthened so that students can be motivated to strive for excellence in learning. To maximize students' opportunities, their giftedness and leadership skills have to be further enhanced. More importantly, it is important to nurture students into good citizens who have a sense of national identity, show respect for the rule of law and abide by the law, hence safeguarding national security. Therefore, Values Education and National Security Education should be further strengthened in our school.

Major concern 2: To further promote teachers' engagement for enhancing the quality of learning and teaching

Achievements

Our school established well-structured staff development periods on Fridays, creating strong culture of staff development in which department, cross-department and whole-school's programmes and trainings can be held every week. In the academic year of 2021/22, there were totally 22 sessions of staff development periods while class suspension and special school vacation occurred in February to May 2022. Our school successfully organized various kinds of subject-based and cross-subject staff development activities to promote teachers' engagement: Class Teachers' Meetings, Committees' Meetings, Staff Meetings, Subject Co-planning, Teachers' Self Care Workshops (3 Dec 2021 and 20 May 2022) and Teachers' Professional Sharing (Topic: Legal Matters in the School Context for Teachers). Teachers' lesson observation exercise was enforced to promote teachers' learning communities related to teaching profession. In 2021/2022, there were 323 lessons being observed by our teachers while lessons in several months were conducted through the online mode.

To strengthen teachers' awareness and understanding on nurturing students as good law-abiding citizens, teachers were encouraged to attend courses regarding Constitution, Basic Law and National Security Education. As of June 2022, all teaching staff had taken at least one course related to Basic Law, Constitution or National Security Law offered by the Education Bureau. 67 out of 73 teaching staff had attended at least two courses or workshops of the related topics offered by the Education Bureau. An onsite teachers' workshop on National Security Education was held on 2 June 2022. Two school-based workshops about National Security Law were organized for non-teaching staff including janitors, teaching assistants and laboratory technicians on 22 June 2022 and 29 June 2022 respectively.

Reflection

In the academic year of 2021/22, teachers' engagement for enhancing the quality of learning teaching as well as their awareness and professional knowledge on Basic Law, Constitution and National Security Education were strengthened. To nurture students into good citizens who have a sense of national identity, show respect for the rule of law and abide by the law, it is important to further strengthen teachers' professional training on values education, National Security education and legal aspects in school contexts. To assure the quality of teaching and learning, peer lesson observation as well as lesson study could be adopted as teacher's self-evaluation tools.

Major concern 3: To further nurture a positive school culture and school norm through Other Learning Experiences and ECA.

3.1 To develop self-discipline and sense of responsibility by conducting moral values and positive reinforcement

Strategies proposed:

• To set up a classroom charter for each class

To develop self-discipline and sense of responsibility, conduct moral values like respect and caring, our students are asked to discuss the classroom charter at the beginning of school term. We have reviewed their progress during the class teacher meeting and successfully, most of them have set specific, measurable and achievable goal for their class. With the good outcome, we have also organized a board design competition.

To build up an awarding scheme for good behavior

In order to promote and maintain the good behavior of our students, we have newly set up some awards on learning attitude during the online lessons, good punctuality, best conduct award and also with the outstanding achievement in different aspects. Trophies and snack were awarded during the class teacher period instead of the morning assembly as the consideration of COVID-19.

To provide training or sharing for the committees of Student Councils, Houses, Prefects, Scout & Librarian.

We have invited 25 student leaders to be the officials of the New World Harbour Race 2021 this year. Through the event, the communication skills and problem solving skills was further developed. A day camp training for prefect team was also organized in August. However, due to the class suspension until May, it is difficult to organize more training to them.

3.2 To create a school culture of Gratitude & Appreciation;

Strategies proposed:

• To launch some volunteer services outside school

In this year, totally we have joined 3 volunteer services: a) distribution of epidemic prevention materials to the needed people b) Po Leung Kuk Virtual Charity Walk c) Po Leung Kuk Flag Day. Through the activities, we hope our students can have a better understanding of Gratitude and Appreciation.

- To promote the culture of Gratitude & Appreciation through class teacher period Teacher and students' sharing were organized during the morning assembly and broadcast to all classes. The following topics have been shared:
 - Emotional Control (情緒管理)
 - Toughness (堅毅)
 - Respect (孝敬)
 - Empathy (同理心)

3.3 To promote mental health among our colleagues and students

Strategies proposed:

- To organize workshops for students and teachers.

 In this year, 2 workshops about mental health namely, 老師鬆一鬆 「火柴人驚怒哀樂遊戲 咭」體驗活動 were organized to teachers on 3 Dec 2021 and 3 May 2022. It mainly introduced the importance of mental health and some games for stress relieving. We are suggested to play the games with our students during class teacher period or recess time.
- To provide counselling activity for students suffering from emotional problem.
 A series of "recess fun" activities were conducted by social counselor & counselling teachers,
 it aimed at providing some fun time to our students. We have also recruited some student counsellors from senior form students to be the helpers.

Achievement—To provide teacher and students' sharing about moral value

During the pandemic and from the class suspension later on, it was lucky that we can still held the morning assembly in a "mixed mode". We have successfully invited teachers and students to have sharing during the morning assembly. Moreover, positive reinforcement is important, we should make good use of this period to assure and recognize the achievement and good behavior of our students,

Reflection

Suffer from the lack of school day and the COVID-19, we concern the following aspect:

Sense of belonging, school life—As there is a lack of outdoor activity in this year. The opportunities of building the relationship between students and even with teachers has been diminished. Furthermore, students' leisure time in our school is also one of our concerns. Conducting moral value and enhancing inter-personal relationship through activities is our main approach. In the coming year, we should better plan to make the school life fruitful—more non-academic programs or activities.

Diversity Learning Grant – Gifted Education Programme Programme Evaluation Report 2021/22

Our school had organized various school-based pull-out activities to develop students' talents and potentials, according to the year plan of Diversity Learning Grant:

- Our school set up a neuroscience program (Neuroscience Club) for scientifically gifted students. It aimed to nurture a group of students who were interested in biological science. In the academic year of 2021/22, these students studied cell culture of rat brain stem cells in our Stem Cell Science Laboratory.
- Our school had a collaborative activity of environment DNA (eDNA) with The Education University of Hong Kong. Students did analysis on freshwater samples collected from local streams. Some of the learning activities were carried out in laboratories in The Education University of Hong Kong.
- Aerospace programme was launched as an extra-curricular activity that students can receive systematic training related to aerospace.
- Archery programme was organized for students in after-school periods in our school archery field.
- Different levels of fitness programmes was organized for students in after-school periods in our fitness centre in the New Annex.
- In the gifted training of ICT Elite team, gifted students in ICT were nominated to participate in Hong Kong Olympiad in Informatics and they got three significant prizes. One student participated in Ampower Talent Institute's IT, Tech & Innovation Master Class Program.
- Many of our students were nominated to join various speech festivals and competitions and debate competitions.
- Three senior form students were nominated to join CUHK Model United Nations Conference 2022.

Due to suspension of face-to-face classes during the serious situation of COVID-19 in January to March and only half-day lessons allowed in 2021/22, the overall schedule of various pull-out programs were greatly affected.

Report on the Use of the Promotion of Reading Grant 21/22 School Year

Part 1: Evaluation of the Effectiveness

1. Evaluation of achievement of the objectives: (e.g. reading culture of the whole school, students' reading attitude, book borrowing situation and students' engagement in reading activities)

We have spent over \$24,000 to purchase books for the Board of Science. It widely covers the areas of Biotechnology, Biology and Aerospace Science. These books are highly related to the school's formal and informal curricula, increasing the interests of students in reading and learning.

Besides, we have spent over \$5,000 to acquire the collection in 「第19屆十本好讀中學組候選書籍」。We are going to launch a book fair, book election and online book recommendation for this collection in 22/23. These books are highly recommended by the public and should be able to raise the reading interest of our students.

2. Evaluation of strategies: (e.g. implementing diversified and motivating activities to promote reading, reading across the curriculum and home school co-operation)

In terms of strategy, instead of e-Books, we have developed an "online articles sharing platform"「美文欣賞計劃」after the school resumed from May 2022 onwards. We released an article once a week through our online platform so students and parents can read the articles. Students were further encouraged to read the relevant books where the articles were selected.

However, due to school suspension, we have cancelled and postponed all the library activities like visits, book-purchase tour and book fair. We can only organize some online reading activities like articles sharing, book recommendation through the online platform and our school websites.
